

WADSWORTH HISTORIC LANDMARK SURVEY

Background

Discussions began in February, 1985, between the City of Wadsworth and the Department of Urban Studies, the University of Akron, regarding an inventory of historically and architecturally significant structures in Wadsworth. Eventually, an agreement was reached to conduct the survey using graduate students from the Department of Urban Studies. The students had training in city planning and historic preservation and were assisted in training for the survey by Steven C. Gordon and Jeff Brown of the Ohio Historic Preservation Office as well as James A. Pahlau of the Summit County Historical Society. Training sessions were conducted in March, 1985, at the University of Akron and field work for this survey was completed primarily between April 4, and July 1, 1985.

Purpose and Scope

The survey was conducted to identify historic resources in Wadsworth that should be recognized and preserved and establish a basis for further historic preservation activities in Wadsworth.

The survey includes properties that have some degree of architectural or historical significance at either the national or local level. Specifically, two categories of properties are identified:

- 1) Landmarks listed or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places; or
- 2) landmarks ineligible for listing on the National Register but of local prominence.

The latter category includes survey works done by the Medina County Regional Planning Commission in 1979. National Register properties or those judged eligible for nomination represent landmarks recognized nationally for their association with historical events or as outstanding elements of American architecture. The final determination of eligibility for the National Register of Historic Places is the responsibility of the U.S. Department of the Interior. Historic resources judged ineligible for National Register nomination are primarily of local significance. These structures may represent a particular architectural style or characterize a neighborhood.

Since the survey contains properties listed or eligible for listing on the National Register, it may be used to determine if community development programs will have any adverse impacts on historic resources. One objective of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Title I, is "the restoration and preservation of properties of special value for historic, architectural, or aesthetic reasons". Eligible activities for grant assistance include preservation or restoration of historic sites. Further, Title I also requires that "recipients must take into account the effect of a project on any district, site, building, structure, or object listed in or found by the Secretary of the Interior, pursuant to 34 CFR part 800, to be eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places". Thus, this survey may facilitate administrative oversight in federally-funded projects since it identifies landmarks listed or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

Methodology

The community was divided into four quadrants with one survey team assigned to each quadrant. Representatives from the Ohio Historic Preservation Office and the Summit County Historical Society alternated between groups to provide further assistance in identifying resources.

Prior to actual field work, a list of priority properties for survey was established by Mr. David Rodich based on historical significance. This list proved invaluable to survey teams in the field. Teams alternated between field work and oral history resources from local residents. Further historical data was compiled by David Rodich, the project director, and interested citizens of Wadsworth. In addition, all surveys were mailed to property owners with requests to provide additional data. Over 50% of the property owners responded to this request and much of the additional data was historical. Eleanor I. Schapiro's Wadsworth Heritage (1964) was a prime source for historical data on Wadsworth.

Selection Rationale

The priority property listing acted as a base listing for properties to be included in the inventory due to historical significance in the community. Survey teams were also encouraged to inventory properties of architectural

significance based on standards set forth by the Ohio Historic Preservation Office. In order to keep the project to a manageable size, a cutoff date for structures built before 1930 was established for the survey teams. This selection criteria proved satisfactory since over 100 properties were inventoried and the priority property listing contained 65 properties. Many of the survey listings were inventoried for architectural significance only.

The survey teams inventoried 101 properties and an additional survey form was completed by the Medina County Regional Planning Commission and is included providing a total of 102 landmark properties in the Wadsworth Historic Landmark Survey.

The inventory forms are numbered MED 340-18 through MED 440-18, using a system developed by the Ohio Historic Preservation Office. "MED" is an abbreviation for Medina County. The first number indicates the specific Wadsworth historic landmark identification number. Three hundred thirty-nine listings had been completed in Medina County prior to this survey. Therefore, survey team members used 340 as their first landmark number. The second number (18) corresponds to an Ohio Historic Preservation Office code for Wadsworth. The inventory forms are arranged in street groupings, alphabetically for ease of review of this document, regardless of the number designation.

Architectural Styles

The early architectural styles most popular in Wadsworth as indicated in the survey were Greek Revival (1830-1850), Vernacular (1870-1900), and Colonial Revival (1890-1920). More than twenty-five historical styles and variations of styles were identified by the survey. The diversity is evident from the former Silas Franks Greek Revival residence (MED 349-18) to the Art Deco Style of the Old Bank Building (MED 408-18).

Residential styles had a wide variety also. A fine example of the Victorian Style (1865-1900) is evident in the Stanley House (MED 421-18) while an excellent example of Stick Style (1860-1890) may be found at the Paul Baker residence on High Street (MED 390-18).

Churches of Wadsworth were done primarily in Revival Styles (Italianate, Renaissance, Romanesque, Gothic). St. Marks Episcopal represents Classical

Revival Style (MED 368-18) while the Grace Lutheran provides an excellent example of Gothic Revival Style (MED 383-18).

Good examples of Tudor Revival (1900-1930) are also found in Wadsworth. The former Don A. Young house, designed by Muroe Walker Copper of Cleveland, the former Ervin Young residence (MED 436-18) designed by Good & Wagner of Akron, and the former Wayne Young residence, now the Methodist Parsonage which was designed by Roy G. Firestone (MED 356-18). All provide excellent examples of Tudor Revival Style in Wadsworth. The latter structure (Methodist Parsonage) is noted especially for the thatch-roof type.

Conclusion

As a result of this survey, the City of Wadsworth may more fully realize the potential assets available in historic resources and preserve them despite pressures for land development and demolition. By maintaining and preserving these assets, the City helps to maintain its heritage, culture, and unique character for future generations.
