

THE DISTRICT MAP REPRESENTS THE AREA THE FIRE & EMS DEPARTMENT PROVIDES SERVICE.









WADSWORTH FIRE DEPARTMENT STRUCTURE FIRE TREND SUMMARY






WADSWORTH FIRE DEPARTMENT RESPONSE TIME COMPARISON 2019 VS. 2020












WADSWORTH EMS CITY VS. TOWNSHIP

WADSWORTH EMS MONTHLY RESPONSE TIME SUMMARY, 2019-2020





WADSWORTH EMS MONTHLY CALL COMPARISON, 2019-2020









THIS CHART REPRESENTS THE NUMBER OF ALL EMERGENCY CALLS IN RELATION TO THE HOUR OF THE DAY.





PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION – 2020

Since 1989 the Fire Department has been educating the citizens of Wadsworth about the importance of fire safety and prevention. Public Safety Education has been comprised of various members of the department providing safety messages to many different groups in the Wadsworth community.



Public Education Programs are presented year round, but due to the COVID-19 pandemic our educators could not get out as often as they normally do. Since Public Safety Education is so important, our educators decided to put together some videos for the community and share them on the department's YouTube channel and social media.

Typically, the fourth grade classes from the elementary schools take a tour of Fire Station 1 in May. Since they could not take this tour, Assistant Chief Potter worked with WCTV to record a video tour of the station and explain the different apparatus and equipment. We also have visitors to Fire Station 2 for tours, so Firefighter Scott Vallant took everyone on a video tour of Fire Station 2. These tours were shared with the community on the Wadsworth Fire Department YouTube channel and also shared by social media.

In July we normally conduct Safety Town for incoming kindergarten students to teach them about the importance of smoke alarms, how to call 9-1-1 in an emergency, what to do if there is a fire, get out and stay out, not to play with lighters and matches, and stop, drop, and roll if their clothes catch on fire. Since we were unable to provide this program due to the pandemic it was decided to put together videos of what the children would normally learn and release them on the department's YouTube channel. This was a joint project with Assistant Chief Potter, Firefighter Scott Vallant, Officers Innocenti and Shonk, the Wadsworth City Schools, and WCTV. Working together videos were produced for what is taught each day at Safety Town. Once the videos were all recorded and uploaded onto the department's YouTube channel a new video released each day of the week in conjunction with what the children would have been taught that day. At the end of the week WCTV combined all of the videos into one continuous video to air on WCTV. The videos were also shared on social media to reach as many community members as possible.

The Public Safety Educators were not able to get out into the community as they normally would, but they adapted to the situation and provided important safety messages with the help of WCTV and social media.

Although the educators could not get into the schools in October during Fire Prevention Week, they were able to provide activity and coloring books with age appropriate material to children from preschool to fourth grade.

The Fire and Life Safety Educators were able to get out and educate some small groups during the year. They provided fire safety training, which is required by the Ohio Department of Health, to the staff at two healthcare facilities. Also they were able to give safety talks to a church youth group of teenagers and three preschool classes with a limited number of children, masks, and social distancing.



Public Safety Education was difficult in 2020 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. Even though the members of the Wadsworth Fire Department could not get out into the community at public events and their normal safety programs they were able to adapt and provide safety messages to the community through social media and educational videos on the department's YouTube channel. The Wadsworth Fire and EMS Departments look forward to getting back into the community to share their important safety messages and interact with the community.
