






Class 1/Major Offense Incident Reports Investigated




Burglary/Thefts by Larceny Type




Thefts by Store




Total Arrests



Adult vs. Juvenile Arrests




Top Ten Arrest Charges 2014




2014 Alcohol/Drug Related Arrests





2014 vs. 2013, Citations Issued




2014 vs. 2013, Crash Reports





Alcohol Related Crashes by Day 2014 vs. 2013



Alcohol Related Crashes by Shift





Total Calls Received by Dispatch




Calls Breakdown by Method Received





2014 Average # Calls Per Day of the Week



LEADS Data






Background Checks Requested/Completed




Background Checks by Month









A number of officers have expressed a desire to change the patch of the Wadsworth Police Department over the past few years. So with the city celebrating the Bicentennial in 2014, Chief Reinke decided the time was right. He asked students from a high school arts class, a local graphic design company and the officers themselves to submit ideas. Eventually the choice was narrowed to two (2) finalists and the Chief had both patches made so everyone could see how they would actually look. The new patch design was the overwhelming favorite among the officers and with the approval of Mayor Robin Laubaugh and Director of Public Safety Matthew Hiscock it became the official patch of the Department on May 1, 2014. The patch was designed by the officers themselves with a great deal of the credit going to Patrol Officer Joshua Cooper and to Sergeant Dave Dorland.

S.W.A.T.



The Wadsworth Police Department currently has four (4) officers who are members of the Medina County SWAT Team. The team was activated on four (4) occasions in 2014.

May 7, 2014 – The SWAT team served a high risk search warrant for the Medina County Sheriff's Office on a Jesse D. Hodges who committed an Aggravated Robbery and had a Deadly Weapon on his person at the time of the incident.

May 19, 2014 – The team responded to a residence on S. Pardee St in Wadsworth for a barricaded suicidal male subject. Negotiators were able to talk the subject into giving himself up after approximately five (5) hours.

July 28, 2014 – The team was activated for a call in Medina Township where a subject had forced entry into the residence of an ex-girlfriend and held her at gun point for several hours. The ex-girlfriend was eventually able to escape from the residence. The subject remained in the residence and failed to communicate any further with the negotiators. At that time the SWAT team breached and the subject showed himself while holding a hand gun to his head. Sgt. Elchlinger of the Wadsworth Police Department was able to talk the subject into putting the gun down and he was subsequently taken into custody.

The team was activated for a fourth (4th) time for an armed barricaded male in the City of Wadsworth but was deactivated prior to arriving on scene because the male subject gave himself up.

Juvenile Traffic Diversion Program

In partnership with Medina County Juvenile Judge John Lohn and the Office of Criminal Justice Services, the Juvenile Diversion program was established as a voluntary program that utilizes driving simulators and class room instruction taught by police officers from various police departments in Medina County. The program is taught on Saturdays at Medina High School for three hours. This program is an alternative to going through the Juvenile Court system and having a juvenile record.

The Juvenile Diversion Program is designed for first time juvenile traffic offenders. It has been documented that this program is very successful.

The Wadsworth Police Department referred 15 juveniles to the Juvenile Traffic Diversion Program during 2014, compared to 20 in 2013.



Alcohol Compliance Checks

The Wadsworth Police Department in conjunction with the Ohio Investigative Unit (O.I.U.) conducted random compliance checks at various licensed alcohol establishments throughout the City in 2014.

May 9th, 2014 – Random Compliance Checks on twenty-two (22) area establishments results in four (4) violations.

October 11th, 2014 – Random Compliance checks on thirty (30) area establishments results in four (4) violations.

The Wadsworth Police Department remains committed to keeping alcohol out of the hands of area youth.



D.U.M.P.

Dispose of Unused Medications Properly

In 2014, the Wadsworth Police Department continued its efforts in assisting the public in proper disposal of unused or unwanted medications through the drop box located in City Hall. The D.U.M.P. box in City Hall is one of 12 that can be located throughout Medina County. During the 2014 calendar year, a total of 722 pounds of unwanted medication were collected and turned over to the Medina County Drug Task Force for disposal. This is in comparison to 765 pounds of unwanted medications collected and turned over in 2013.

On April 26, 2015 WPD also participated in the National Prescription Drug “Take Back Day”. An Auxiliary Officer was on hand to collect unwanted medications from the public.

Bike Patrol

School Resource Officer (SRO)

In 2014, Officer Innocenti continued to serve as the Wadsworth Police Department's SRO officer. The SRO Officer is the primary point of contact for the Wadsworth City Schools should they need a police officer. The SRO position allows the Wadsworth Police Department to work closely with the schools in order to enhance school safety and improve community relations. As part of his duties, Officer Innocenti conducted numerous trainings with the schools in 2014 to include:

Medina County Criminal Patrol Task Force and OVI Task Force

In 2014 the Wadsworth Police Department had thirteen (13) officers appointed special deputation through the Medina County Sheriff's Office that allowed them to participate in Criminal Patrol Task Force (CPTF) and OVI Task Force events throughout the county. From April 11, 2014 through September 26, 2014, Medina County Criminal Patrol Task Force held 12 events.

Medina County Drug Task Force

In 2014 the Wadsworth Police Department (WPD) and the Medina County Drug Task Force (MCDTF) continued on with the Memorandum of Understanding between the agencies.

During 2014 the MCDTF conducted one hundred and eighteen (118) drug related investigations in the city of Wadsworth leading to eighty-two (82) people being arrested on one hundred and twenty-one (121) criminal charges. Another seven (7) people were arrested on nine (9) outstanding warrants - five (5) felony, four (4) misdemeanor - during the course of the investigation. An additional twenty-one (21) criminal cases are pending presentation to a Medina County Grand Jury.

Agents of the MCDTF executed nine (9) search warrants in the city of Wadsworth and neutralized a total of seven (7) clandestine (methamphetamine) labs. This is in comparison to four (4) clandestine (methamphetamine) labs that were neutralized in 2013. A total of sixteen (16) forensic examinations of mobile devices were conducted by the MCDTF to assist in WPD investigations.

Prior to 2014 WPD had a patrol officer assigned to the MCDTF on a full time basis to conduct drug investigations primarily within the City but to also assist with investigations throughout Medina County. That position was vacant during the 2014 calendar year. It is believed that not having an officer assigned to the task force in 2014 partially attributed to the decrease in the total number of drug related arrests and amount of drugs seized. WPD hopes to reassign a new officer to that designated position.



Overdose Deaths and the Use of NARCAN



NARCAN is a medication utilized in emergency response incidents to counteract heroin overdose. A majority of Wadsworth Police Department's officers received NARCAN training from members of Summa Health Systems on May 9th, 2014 as well as online training through eOPOTA. On July 29, 2014 the WPD received NARCAN kits which were provided free of charge by Summa Health Systems.

In 2014, the use of heroin and the number of unintentional overdoses and resulting deaths remained a very prevalent issue. There were a total of two (2) deaths from heroin overdose in the City of Wadsworth in 2014. Since receiving the NARCAN kits, WPD officers have used NARCAN on five (5) separate occasions. Four (4) of the five (5) incidents resulted in effectively saving the individual who had overdosed.

Departmental Awards

Officer-of-the-Year Award

Patrol Officer Daniel Chafin was named Officer-of-the-Year for 2014. He was selected to receive this award by a majority of his peers and front-line supervisors. He was awarded the Officer-of-the-Month award for his overall performance during the months of December 2013 and September 2014. Officer Chafin has consistently been an aggressive investigator on his assigned incident reports, pursuing the truth and holding suspects accountable for their criminal activity. He has also accepted additional responsibilities in the areas of instructing departmental personnel in firearms, Taser and field training our newest patrol officers.



Departmental Commendation Award

Patrol Officer Pete Spoerke was awarded a Departmental Commendation for life saving efforts he made on the morning of July 8, 2014. WPD Dispatch received a 911 call about a female possibly having a heart attack, was unconscious, not breathing and without a pulse. Ptl. Spoerke responded and arrived on scene within minutes of Wadsworth EMS. Upon arrival Ptl. Spoerke saw that the paramedic administering chest compressions was fatigued and the other paramedic was preparing breathing equipment and unable to assist. Ptl. Spoerke quickly stepped in and continued compressions until a third paramedic arrived. Ptl. Spoerke's quick actions contributed to saving the female's life and is deserving of the Blue Commendation Award.
